Visit From Homeland Security

TAIA officers Chairman Darin Hofferichter, Vice Chairman Charlie Grymes Past Chairman Jimmy Schulz and President Donnie Dippel met with Homeland Security Officials David Wulf, Director of Infrastructure Security, Annie Hunziker, Communications Coordinator, and Christopher Alonzo, Chemical Security Inspector of the Infrastructure Security Compliance Division. Director Wulf was very complimentary of the help they received from TAIA getting Texas agriculture industries registered with Homeland Security. There was discussion on the Fertilizer Bill HB942 that was passed this last session and EPA's changes to the Risk



Management Plans on anhydrous ammonia. The importance of facilities participating in the Responsible Ag Program was also discussed. They also asked for our help in getting out information from their agency and they offered a compliance assistance visit to anyone who needed help with compliance issues.

I lost count of how many different drafts of bills we saw, how many committee meetings we attended, how many trips were made to Austin, and how many office visits we made to member's offices

License Plates on Fertilizer Spreaders?

Over the last year companies have called into the Texas Ag Industry Association (TAIA) office saying that they had their equipment stopped and were told they needed license plates on pull type equipment like fertilizer spreaders, anhydrous nurse tanks and weed sprayers according to Motor Vehicle Registration (MVR). After talking with MVR, they felt that this pull type equipment should be classified as a trailer. We argued that this type of equipment has always been classified as implements of husbandry and was exempt from having license plates. MVR's view was that the implement of husbandry language did not cover fertilizer spreaders, anhydrous nurse tanks, or weed sprayers since they were on a trailer frame and could be converted to a trailer by removing the fertilizer box or tank. Another concern was if the equipment required a license and exceeded the gross weight limit of 4500 pounds, it would also be required to have tail lights and turn signals.

TAIA took this concern to Representative Kacal and Senator Perry and by working with them, they filed Senate Bill 971 that expanded the implement of husbandry language to include these pull type pieces of equipment. When pulling these types of equipment remember to observe the implement of husbandry rules; we cannot afford to lose this exemption. If you get the chance to visit with Representative Kacal or Senator Perry, please thank them for carrying this legislation that saved our industry from a tremendous financial burden.

For example, I remember one day prior to House Bill HB 942 going to the floor for a vote visiting thirty-four offices in one day.

The major goal of TAIA was to keep the legislation focused on the storage of ammonium nitrate and not to encompass the storage of the other fertilizer materials or agriculture chemicals handled by our industry. Our second goal was to allow those companies who wanted to handle ammonium nitrate (AN) a solution to handle the product in manner that would prevent future events like those at West Fertilizer. HB 942 filed by Representative Kacal and Senator Birdwell placed the enforcement jurisdiction under the Office of the State Chemist and did not give rule making authority to the State Fire Marshall. During the session there were other bills filed that would have given rule making authority to the State Fire Marshall allowing him to determine how the legislation would be enforced. Another bill would have allowed the Department of Insurance, the State Fire Marshall, Office of the State Chemist and other agencies to do a risk assessment to determine the amount of insurance a company would be required to have if they stored AN.

TAIA would like to thank everyone for all the support we received from the membership to accomplish the legislation in HB 942. Without members visiting state legislators, testifying in hearings, and supporting financially, we would not have been able to accomplish our goals. TAIA owes Representative Kacal and Senator Birdwell a big thank you for taking a very common sense approach to addressing every one's concerns.

Farming and Ranching Under the New "Waters of the U.S." Rule

On August 28, 2015, the new rule recently issued by EPA and the Army Corps of Engineers defining "waters of the U.S." (WOTUS) will officially go into effect. The rule expands federal Clean Water Act (CWA) jurisdiction over many landscape features found on private lands—including farm, ranch and forest lands across the nation. As a result, many essential and commonplace farming, ranching and forestry practices may now result in "discharges" of "pollutants" into WOTUS that require a CWA permit. Unauthorized discharges to WOTUS will be a violation of federal law, subject to large potential penalties in enforcement by the government or private citizens.
